We encourage you to attend your child's **Parent–Teacher Conference**. Parent-Teacher conferences serve as a face to face check point to determine if current instruction is meeting the complex needs of students. The relationship between a parent, teacher,

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and a student must be continuous. It is our intent that this on-going dialogue will continue to ensure a positive course for your child's learning during the school year. Please keep in mind that your child must maintain a 65% or higher course grade average in order to be promoted to the next grade. Getting off to a good start is critical given instruction becomes more rigorous as the school year progresses. Five week report cards are scheduled to be sent out on or around October 10th and 10 week marks close November 13th.

You can also monitor your child's learning by familiarizing yourself with your child's subjects. You can learn about grade-level curriculum by logging on to the district's website at <u>www.nfschools.net</u>, click on 'Academics', and hi-light curriculum by grade level. In addition for monitoring purposes, you can register for the district's parent portal where you can track your child's grades, attendance, and other records.

As always, we continue to request that you encourage your child to read as much as possible. As you know, reading is a vital skill needed across <u>all</u> subject areas. Over the course of the school year, your child is expected to read daily both in school and outof-school. Independent reading helps our students to develop and improve skills that will allow them to be better readers, writers, thinkers, and life-long learners.

Please feel free to call our office at any time if you have an idea or a question. I <u>truly</u> <u>believe</u> that Gaskill is a GREAT school with GREAT students and staff, therefore, we undoubtedly will have a GREAT year!

YES, THERE IS HOMEWORK IN SCIENCE. YOUR CHILD SHOULD BE BRINGING THEIR SCIENCE NOTEBOOK HOME AT LEAST TWICE A WEEK, AND SHOULD BE STUDYING THE MATERIAL IN IT.

Remember: Being prepared, paying attention, having respect, studying at home and being safe are the guidelines for being successful in science class!

Grade 8 Science- NYS Lab is in May and the Written Exam is June 6.

In 8th grade we will constantly be reviewing for the Grade 8 New York State Science Assessments. We also have some form of graded assignment every week and/or every other week, so students should be studying for homework. You can always check PowerSchool for dates of upcoming assessments.

Parent Teacher conferences are set for October 15th. Please know that if you bring your child to a scheduled conference with me, they will get 10 points to use towards any test of their choosing.

Grade 8 math students will be working on transformations and congruence & similarity.

Algebra students will be working on Chapter 2 (linear equations) and Chapter 3 (linear functions).

Accelerated Science- Regent's Exam is June 15 Living Environment Requirements governed by the State

The above also applies for accelerated classes. We always have some form of assessment (Test, lab, quiz, and/or project) that students can be studying for at home. And remember:

This is a Regents Science course, and by state regulation it has specific laboratory requirements. This includes the actual laboratory work (completed in school) and an acceptable written report for each lab. If a student fails to meet these requirements by the beginning of June 2016, he/ she will not be permitted to take the Regents examination. This will also exclude them from taking the Regents exam in the summer, since they did not meet the lab requirements during the school year. All students will be informed of the requirements as well (and will constantly be reminded). And all students are always welcome after school for extra instruction and/or to make up work.



News from Mrs. Englander:

During October and November we will be reading and discussing Harper Lee's <u>To Kill A</u> <u>Mockingbird</u>.

I couldn't be more excited to share this American classic with your child in class! Outside of class, your child should be reading 20-30 minutes every night.

So, YES.....they DO have homework for ELA!



"Mockingbirds don't do one thing but make music for us to enjoy. They don't eat up people's gardens, don't nest in corncribs, they don't do one thing but sing their hearts out for us. That's why it's a sin to kill a mockingbird."

In 1991 the Library of Congress conducted a survey of book readers. Readers were asked to cite books that had made a difference in their lives. One of the books most often cited was Harper Lee's *To Kill a Mocking-bird*. The only book ranked higher by readers was the Bible.

Harper Lee's novel, originally published in 1960, opens with an adult Scout Finch reminiscing about her childhood. Through Scout's memories, the reader is transported into the world of a small southern town in the 1930s. Using a literary technique called **flashback**, Lee interrupts Scout's chronological narrative to reach back in time and enhance and amplify the story with prior events.

Throughout her childhood, Scout develops and expands her values and ideas as she encounters characters who come from all levels of Maycomb's society. While other novels have explored similar themes as *To Kill a Mockingbird*, few have done so in such a rich and enduring way. Scout learns about justice and injustice by watching the trial of an African American man. She witnesses the divisions of class and race in her small town. She discovers courage, both in herself and in those around her, and she comes to respect the diversity of the people in her community, people such as Tom Robinson and Boo Radley. There is rarely a situation in which Scout does not learn something new about education, superstition, bravery, or cowardice.

The story Lee tells evolves in a world where children lose their innocence as they grow up and encounter the harsh realities of adult life. Yet Lee's story is also about accepting people for who they are, whether they have a different skin color, like Tom Robinson, or are eccentric, like Boo Radley!!!
