The Stewardship Project Vote December 12

*The Stewardship Project:
protecting the community's
investment in public schools.*

Every District is required to complete a periodic assessment of all its buildings. New York State Education Law and regulations require a building condition survey (BCS) for all occupied school buildings to be conducted at least every five years. Based on the findings of that survey, districts must then decide what action needs to be taken to protect the substantial investments communities have already made in their schools. Taking appropriate action also protects communities from having to scramble with an unprepared-for calamity, like a leaking roof for example.

The District's BCS drew attention to some needed projects. There are also some items that simply need to be addressed, and some that it just makes sense to address.

Here are some highlights.

Roofs & Lots

New roofs are needed quite badly at Maple Avenue School and Cataract Elementary School. In addition, it seems like the 'new' high school opened yesterday, but in fact it was 2000 when the first students reported to class.

Likewise, the well-used facility, which welcomes not only students but the community at large for events and programs that take place almost every day of the year, is surrounded by a well-used parking lot. It needs repair, too. Just take a drive there; see for yourself.

Kitchen at 79th Street School

Seventy-ninth Street School is the only remaining school with no hot kitchen. To build one within the existing footprint of the building is a goal of this project. That's an issue of parity; every student should be able to get meals of comparable quality, as fresh and as hot as possible. That is especially true in a community where some students may get their most nutritious meal during the school day.

Cataract: Bigger isn't always better



Many will recall that before it was an elementary school, Cataract Elementary School was Niagara Middle School. Middle school students are larger than elementary school students. With some students in Universal Pre-Kindergarten being only four-years-old, they are quite a bit smaller in stature than the 12-year-olds who used to attend the school. Desks can be changed, but not everything is easily adjusted to very small children, especially those who are mastering the most basic of skills. That is why we need to update the facilities to make them easier for the students to use. Imagine if your home toilet were as high as your hip. It would create a problem, wouldn't it?

Air Conditioning

Four elementary schools -- Mann, 79th, Hyde Park, and Maple need air-conditioning. As this autumn showed, there is no telling how long it will be hot outside and with extended school day programs and summer programming, this has become a greater issue. It is also an equity issue, as Niagara Street, Cataract, Kalfas, and Abate are already climate controlled year-long.

CAT 6 Wiring

With the coming of full implementation of computer-based testing and all the technology in the classroom today, it is necessary to keep Ethernet and other technology cables compatible and up to the job of transmitting all the data needed among laptops, interactive white boards, and printers. Category 6 wiring will ensure we are able to use our investment in technology to the maximum degree with no problem, now and for the foreseeable future.

From the Superintendent



Before the holiday crush begins, I am asking residents to take a moment on **December 12, Tuesday, between noon and 9 p.m. to cast a vote on the calling \$55 million capital projects we are calling The Stewardship Project.**

This issue is full of detailed information, but in general the purpose of these projects is maintain our infrastructure -- things like roofs, parking lots, curb and sidewalk work-as well as upgrading our wiring for technology to Category 6 twisted pair cable for Ethernet and other network layers.

GJ Mann needs new windows and window treatments. Maple, NFHS, and Cataract need roof repair or replacement. The need to attend to the parking lot at NFHS is evident to anyone who drives through it; time and daily use take a toll. Seventy-ninth Street School needs a kitchen, as it is the only school in the District that does not have one. We are also planning, if this referendum is successful, to air con-

dition the remaining four elementary school that are not already air conditioned.

These projects will cause NO INCREASE TO THE SCHOOL TAX LEVY.

We do, however, need a 60% in favor vote in order for these referendum to pass.

If successful, the projects will be completed in two phases, and will generate work for the skilled trades and labor. The District is happy to use local, union labor to enhance our physical plant.

I am fortunate that previous Superintendents and the Board of Education, with the support of the community, have made wise investments in our school facilities and made sure our students have the best technology, STEM labs, and athletic facilities. With your help, it is my goal to take proper care of the community's schools.

Finally, from our District family and my own family to each of yours, best wishes for a happy, safe, and memorable holiday season and healthy and productive New Year.

Healthy Holiday Tips

The holiday season is a time for celebrating with family and friends...which means food, food, and more food! Not to mention that with more to pack into our already busy schedules, who has time for exercise?

Keeping up with healthy habits has benefits for your whole body – like helping to avoid holiday weight gain, helping to fend off holiday stress and fatigue, and helping to keep your immune system strong. With a little thought and planning, you can still enjoy the holidays, while keeping food nutrition and physical activity in mind.

Tips for healthy holiday eating:

- Feed your children – and yourself – a light meal or snack before going to a holiday party. It's harder to avoid overeating when you're overly hungry.
- Set a good example for children by eating fruits, vegetables, and whole grains with meals or as snacks.

- Offer to bring a healthy, low-calorie dish to holiday parties so you'll know that at least one healthy item will be available.

- Teach your children to eat smaller portions of food to control their calorie intake.
- Choose water or bubbly water mixed with 100% fruit juice. Drinks that are high in added sugars have calories, but no beneficial nutrients.

Funding

The District has found a way to meet its needs without burdening the local taxpayer, by using, in part, QZABs or Qualified Zone Academy Bonds. Congress created the QZAB program, which provides bondholders with a federal tax credit in lieu of a cash interest payment. The federal government provides the interest payment, so the district then is typically only responsible for repaying the value of the bond. This reduces the burden on local communities when financing school renovation.

But what about the value of the bond? In our case, due to the relative poverty of our area, we realize a 98% reimbursement rate from the State on approved capital projects. That leaves a local share of only two percent. However, the District still has \$1.4 million in EXCEL grant funds, with which it can pay that two percent.

Moreover, the State reimburses its 98% based on a calculation that includes an interest rate that districts using don't actually pay, thereby reimbursing a bit more than the district actually spent.

These projects will not increase the school tax levy.

Safety Corner

Cold Weather Safety Tips from Health Services

At this time of year, it is a good idea to talk with your children about cold weather safety. Extra care is needed especially in younger children to be sure that frostbite does not occur.

Make sure all children including teenagers have appropriate outerwear every day. Warm jackets, hats, scarves, boots, and an extra pair of gloves in their pockets will protect them during extremely cold temperatures.

Develop an emergency plan and review it with your children in case you are not home either before or after school. If a bus is delayed, they need to know where, when, and how to get help. Tell your child that if you are not home while they are waiting outside for the bus, how long they may wait outside, where to go in the event the bus is delayed, and what the dangers and risks of extreme weather are. Advise your child to seek help

if they have:

Wet clothing, boots or gloves, snow or ice next to bare skin which cannot be removed.

Pain or numbness or burning anywhere on their skin (especially hands, feet, ears, or nose).

To wait no longer than five minutes if temperatures have dipped into the teens, especially on a windy day. Teach your child about:

When to ask for help.
Where to find safe shelter in an emergency

Who is the designated adult to go to in your neighborhood

How to protect themselves with proper winter clothing.

The danger signs of frost-bite.
