Below, what is it like to be an engineer? Deborah Hick's second grade class at Henry J. Kalfas Elementary recently discovered the answer to this question. They completed a hands-on activity in the STEM lab that involved using engineering skills and team work.

The students were given a task to build a bridge using marshmallows and toothpicks. The bridge had to be strong enough to support a small amount of weight. It had to be long enough to connect two chairs positioned apart a small distance. Students had to think like engineers while building the structure. They worked in small groups for the activity and used mathematical skills to measure width and length.

At the end of the activity, each group presented their bridge to the class and discussed how they built the structure. They shared what it felt like to be an engineer, and the skills that were used to complete the project.

Primary grade students (grades k, one, and two) adopted a trimester schedule this year. Research indicates that trimester reporting for primary grades is more accurate and realistic than the traditional quarterly report card.

With that change, questions have arisen concerning when is the appropriate time to inform parents that their child is in danger of non-promotion. To address this as effectively as possible, letters informing parents that their child is at risk of non-promotion should go out around March 1st. The rationale is as follows:

- The parent-teacher conferences scheduled prior to this date allows teachers and parents the opportunity to have a meaningful discussion around student data and testing results, so that the parent knows the specific areas of concern prior to receiving any letter.
- Specific strategies and/or practices can be shared with the parent so they know how to help their child improve. This will foster a valuable partnership with parents.
- There are approximately three and a half months left in the school year, in which a significant amount of instruction takes place.
- The new trimester standards-based report card is quite detailed and provides more infor-

Business Entrepreneurship allows the Niagara Falls High School student an actual, hands-on experience as they run a real business (*Groovie Smoothie and Coffee Shop*) during their regular course schedule. This multi-faceted class allows the student to exit high school with the skills necessary to be college and career ready/employable. Students explore self-employment benefits versus risks and develop specific competencies necessary to start a business. It covers the characteristics of an entrepreneur as well as the economics and the nature of small business. Also included are feasibility studies, business plan development, types of ownership, location, financing, recordkeeping, management, promotion, legal issues, business protection, and health regulations etc.



Class Format

The course consists of the study of the above mentioned as well as individual construction/presentation of a business plan including a resume'.

Achieving an 80% or higher in the Course makes the student eligible for a college credit at NCCC.

Calling parents of Seniors, others



Each year, teachers and staff, supported by parents and community volunteers, host the Post Prom Party at Niagara Falls High School. The basic idea is that, in the hours after the Senior prom, Seniors and their dates return to NFHS and remain there until several hours later.

The bounce houses, mechanical bulls, free food and drink, magicians, fortune tellers, basketball court, Velcro walls, and all the other activities which have been offered for entertainment in the past have proved very popular with Seniors and have kept them off roads and away from unwholesome activities.

Many communities have suffered tragic losses of teens around prom and graduation time, as excitement has given way to poor decision making. Drunk or reckless driving has cost lifelong heart-ache. In other cases, inappropriate intimacy has resulted in curtailed opportunities, and life-changing ramifications. The Post Prom Party aims to avoid all those things, and to provide a popular, safe alternative, so teens can have fun and parents can enjoy prom night worry-free.

Although it is a noble goal, State Education Law prohibits the use of tax dollars to fund such an undertaking. That is why the community is key to successfully hosting the Post Prom Party, which typically costs around \$25,000.



Safety Corner

Lithium Ion Battery Safety for Consumers



Lithium ion batteries supply power to many kinds of devices including smart phones, laptops, scooters, e-cigarettes, smoke alarms, toys, and even cars. Take care when using them. In rare cases, they can cause a fire or explosion.

The problem

- These batteries store a large amount of energy in a small amount of space.
- Sometimes batteries are not used the right way; batteries not designed for a specific use can be dangerous.
- Like any product, a small number of these batteries are defective. They can overheat, catch fire, or explode.

Safety Tips

- Purchase and use devices that are listed by a qualified testing laboratory.
- Always follow the manufacturer's instructions.
- Only use the battery that is designed for the device.
- Put batteries in the device the right way.
- Only use the charging cord that came with the device.
- Do not charge a device under your pillow, on your bed or on a couch.
- Keep batteries at room temperature.
- Do not place batteries in direct sunlight or keep them in hot vehicles.
- Store batteries away from anything that can catch fire.

Signs of a Problem
Stop using the battery if you notice the problems.

- odor
- change in color
- too much heat
- change in shape
- leaking
- odd noises

If it is safe to do so, move the device away from anything that can catch fire. Call **9-1-1**.

Battery Disposal

- Do not put lithium ion batteries in the trash.
- Recycling is always the best option.
- Take them to a battery recycling location or contact your community for disposal instructions.
- Do not put discarded batteries in piles.
- Lithium ion batteries should be placed in a sealed metal container.

Rainbow Wraps

- 4 tablespoons cream cheese, low-fat (whipped)
- 2 flour tortillas
- 1/2 teaspoon ranch seasoning mix
- 1/4 cup broccoli (washed and chopped)
- 1/4 cup carrot (peeled and grated)
- 1/2 tomato (diced)
- 1/8 cup green bell pepper (seeded and diced)

1. In a small bowl, stir ranch seasoning into cream cheese, chill.
2. Wash and chop vegetables.
3. Spread cream cheese onto flour tortilla, staying one inch from edge. Sprinkle vegetables over cream cheese. Roll tortilla tightly.
4. Chill for 1-2 hours before serving (the wrap will hold its shape better). With a sharp knife slice into circles and serve.

Enrichment Program/Acceleration Program Testing

Elementary Enrichment/Acceleration Program Testing (CoGAT)

The Niagara Falls City School District will be holding the annual CogAT testing to determine eligibility for entrance into the Elementary Enrichment Program, as well as into the Preparatory School Acceleration Programs for the 2017-18 School Year. This year, the CogAT will be a computer-based test. This means that all students will be taking the CogAT on a computer.

There will be no paper and pencil test. Testing will take place in class during the regular school day. The test will be administered the week of March 13-16.

All current Grade 1 and Grade 6 students will be taking the test. Students currently in Grade 2-5 will be tested based on teacher recommendation or parent request. Any student living in the City of Niagara Falls who would like to take the CogAT, but attends a charter school or other private school, will be tested at their NFCSD home school. There will not be any Saturday testing this year.

If you would like to request that your child be tested, you must submit a letter of request to:





Henry J. Kalfas Magnet School is a Special Place

With the magnet school application currently being distributed for the 2017-2018 school year, students and staff at the school wanted to share why Kalfas is a special place.

All students at Henry J. Kalfas Magnet School wear a daily uniform to school. It reflects a commitment to look professional at all times and to prepare students for future success. Kalfas is the only school in the District where students are required to wear a daily uniform.

There is a theme at Kalfas that focuses on communication, technology, and futures. Mr. Thomas Fisher, theme specialist, works with the classroom teachers to incorporate the Kalfas theme into student instruction. Many teachers have facilitated hands-on activities in the S.T.E.M. lab. Recently, a second grade class worked in small groups to build bridges using engineering skills.

In addition, there are various clubs that students participate in to build communication skills. The morning news club presents the daily announcements through television broadcast. The ambassador club is made up of students who serve as leaders by assisting staff members at school events and by helping small children at school arrival and dismissal. A new club focusing on S.T.E.M. was recently launched at the school where students will work in small groups on hands-on projects.
