Drawing Unit- Value Half and Half Celebrity Portrait



After fine tuning some line drawing foundations, welcome to value! Value means showing dark and light in artwork. Let's explore shading with graphite, which is the gray material that smudges easily in every pencil! Experiment with value and shading on your own. You may blend your shading with a cotton swab or your finger and erase as needed if the drawing gets too dark too quick. This is a class favorite and popular project - enjoy!

Explore at your own pace:

Vocabulary:

- Value- an element of art that shows light and dark
- Shading- a value technique (typically graphite or charcoal)
- Graphite- gray art medium in pencils
- *Blending* smoothing our value transitions (for smooth gradation)
- Portrait- artwork of a person

What to do-

- 1. Explore PowerPoint- copy and paste into a web browser: file:///Users/rachelparker/Downloads/1.%20Half%20and%20Half%20%20Celebrity%20Portrait%20and%20intro.pdf
- 2. Watch parts of videos as needed, you do not need to watch the whole video:
 - sketch and shade a face
 - Do's and Don'ts of how to shade a realistic face
- 3. Value Scale Practice:
 - Dark to light
 - Move the pencil up and down
 - Experiment with hard and soft grades of graphite
 - Try to show smooth blending in layers without smudging yet



Directions:


- Finish shading the other half of the face, then hair. Hair can be drawn in as hair by hair texture.
 - o click for how to draw hair in a bun video
 - o click for how to draw short hair video
 - Hands, clothes and background are extra credit.
- Match dark to light values the best you can with a graphite pencil provided. Shade dark to light.
- It is about showing the highlights and shadows, not contour lines. Blend from shadows into highlights.

Example Process Pictures: see how I look for the darkest areas first



- ★ In class, we did a graphite transfer and traced important contour lines to leave a map to help us with shading, which you are not required to do at home. You may use the transferred map lines in the image below to help you fill in the shading or use the blank one on the next page, whichever is easier for you.
- ★ This project is more about how well you match dark to light, not how well you draw the lines of a face, so you can trace lines using a window and tape it in place to keep it still.
- * Reference shading process pictures above or the last complete photographic image for shading help
- ★ If you do not want to draw/trace and shade Michelle Obama, you will need to find a good quality, large, realistic, photograph of another iconic, famous celebrity to help you shade in the other half **as real as possible**!

- ★ You may find your own LARGE celebrity image instead! see image search video (click: Google Images, Tools, Size, Large) Double check to make sure it looks clear- sometimes large images can look fuzzy and pixelated. This is not a good quality image, find a better one!
- ★ If you are left handed, you may shade the left side of the face.
