on the District's certificates of participation (COPs) outstanding to 'BBB+' from 'BBB'. S&P Global Ratings assigned its 'BBB+' rating to the COPs based on the application of its "Issue Credit Ratings Linked To U.S. Public Finance Obligors' Creditworthiness" criteria, published Jan. 22, 2018. According to S & P, the outlook offset by the district's: is stable. S&P Global Ratings withdrew its rating on the District's 1998 COPs, as these bonds are no longer outstanding.

"The upgrades reflect several factors; however, the most compelling is the recent growth in fund balance," said S&P Global Ratings credit analyst Lauren Freire.

We have tried so far this year to provide new resources for District families and, in some cases, the community at large, through our Speakers Series, mental health initiatives, and after school programming.

We continue to seek out every possibility to fund these programs, and are grateful to be able to offer after school opportunities through the Extended Day Program, 21st Century Elementary and 21st Century Prep, as well as the Empire State After-School Program. Student participation in these programs grows daily.

The Family Community Engagement Grant allows us to establish programs designed to increase family engagement in student education. Mentoring programs also will take place that will focus on minority males and their specific needs within the district.

All elementary schools now offer fresh fruits and/ or vegetables to all students, daily, outside of breakfast and lunch time via a Fresh Fruits and Vegetables Cart. Staffed by NFCSD Food Service staff, this program aims to increase fruit and vegetable consumption for our children.

At Niagara Falls High School, students are taking college bearing classes at Niagara University. Coordination, including student registration and scheduling has already occurred. Meanwhile, Reading Recovery is in full swing at Kalfas Magnet School. At the prep level, students are enjoying a new program called F-Bites. (See story on page 5).

Prep school for most students can be overwhelming...new building, new friends, class schedules, mul-

external influences specific to their own environment, as they embark on their journey to adulthood.

At Gaskill, we focus on providing a safe and supportive learning environment where continuous academic and yeswhat growth is our key and foremost charge. It is our belief and conviction that every child should feel welcomed, excited about learning, and grow academically, socially, and when you walk in classrooms on a daily basis, you will see all of our students utilizing technology in their classrooms, participating in skillbased lessons which include a component where students individually self-assess their own learning. Every student has the ability to tell you what they are learning on that particular day and why they are learning the topic. In addition, at the end of the class, students self-check their understanding of the lesson,

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inform the teacher, and receive additional support from teachers if they have not clearly understood the lesson. This allows the student to 'own' their own learning and partner with their teacher on a daily basis and helps them to possess skills which will allow them throughout their lifetime to self-monitor. When talking to students, I have found that students not only possess a better understanding of the learning process, but are also cognizant of teaching practices. We want our students to 'think deeply and understand deeply.' Our teachers consistently use research base practices, analyze data to meet students' needs, while setting goals for students' individual growth and improvement. In addition, a unique instructional feature at the middle school level is the first period of the day is dedicated to providing all students with academic support whether they are Grade 8 honor students working on school projects as part of their Algebra I, Living

Environment, or Global I studies or students who are not at grade level needing additional support.

Research shows middle school is a pivitol time in a student's life. During this time students can either be placed successfully on the trajectory to high school, college and career-or descend on a downward pathway. Without extra support, students are more likely to get in trouble and fall behind. Access to enrichment opportunities makes the difference in school success for most prep school students. It is for that reason, the Niagara Falls City School District provides multiple afterschool programs for our students to extend their school day. Afterschool programming is very popular at GPS. Last year, approximately 80% of our student body participated in one or more of our afterschool programs. Some (Continued page 3)

The goal of the Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program (FFVP) is to provide healthy snack option for students. The FFVP takes place following breakfast and is available 10 a.m. - 1 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Following breakfast, the fruit or vegetable of the day is displayed on a cart so students wanting an additional healthy snack can take an item to consume at that time or during an appropriate snack time later in the day.

> The cart with fresh fruits and vegetables will be set up in the cafeteria area where a staff member from the school will wheel the cart to a fover area or a high traffic area for students.

Snacks are available to all students from 10 a.m. -1 p.m. The program is grant-funded.

of the afterschool enrichment programs our teachers provide are:

• Math and ELA Clubs -To allow re-teaching and pre-teaching of math concepts and provide individualized instruction; support students in reading - writing development, understand key ideas, details, craft, and structure text.

The Robotics Club allows students the opportunity to design robots which complete a specific task while competing for points against another team. Each team prepares for an interschool scrimmage and also a tournament.

Beauty & Brains Club allows students to learn the chemistry behind beauty products. Students create products including bath bombs and lip balms, and learn about STEM careers in the multi-billion dollar beauty industry.

Performing Arts Club -Students at both prep schools have the opportunity to participate in multiple performing art activities throughout the

Living Wellness of Niagara focuses on a variety of needs, including academic, behavioral and social emotional. Small group, individual, or family counseling sessions are provided.

Girls Circle, facilitated by Community Missions of Niagara Frontier, Inc., is designed to foster self-esteem, maintain authentic connection with peers and women, counter trends of self-doubt, and allow for genuine self-expression through verbal sharing and creative activity. The group specifically addresses the growing issue within schools of how to best address problem behaviors among female students.

Winning Because I Tried, facilitated by Modie Cox, teaches students that it is not about the win or the loss, but believing in their own abilities.

Lastly, an important part of our school commitment involves developing key relationships with our parents. The first quarter of the school year has ended. Parent communication is extremely important to ensure students continue to be successful. Therefore we encourage parents to read our school newsletter, log on to our website, join us on Facebook, to register and utilize the district's parent portal where parents will be able to view their child's up-to-date course grades as well as daily attendance, or call our school to set-up an appointment to discuss your child's progress. If we successfully educate and empower our middle school children, they hopefully will transfer their 'habits of mind' into high school and beyond, but it takes all of us to do so.

Mandated Physical Exam Notice

Dear Parent/Guardian:

New York State Law Section 903, Article 19, mandates that all students who are in Pre-Kindergarten or Kindergarten, and those in grades 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, and 11, or who are new entrants, have a physical exam. If your child had a physical exam completed by his/her own Health Care Provider on or after September 5, 2017, please send a copy of the physical to your child's school nurse.

The Community Health Center of Buffalo is scheduled to rotate to all schools throughout our District this year. You may choose this option for your child's mandated physical exam or working paper physical exam only; all sport physical exams must be completed by the District Nurse Practitioner. In addition, our District Nurse Practitioner will be available to complete a mandated physical exam for all students who have not otherwise opted out. Please see below and choose the option that you are most comfortable with. Understand that if you choose the Community Health Center of Buffalo your child will become a patient of this practice.

We would also like to let you know that all students in grades Pre-Kindergarten or Kindergarten, and those in grades 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, and 11, or who are newly entered, who have not yet presented a physical by their Health Care Provider, or have indicating their preferred option, will receive a physical exam by the District Nurse Practitioners. If your child has a pending appointment for a physical exam with his/her Health Care Provider, please provide us with the date below.



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Cornell Co-operative Extension: Have a Balanced Holiday Season

The holiday season is a time for celebrating with family and friends...which means food, food, and more food! As a parent one of our roles in to use mindful eating techniques to help children self-select healthier foods. A simple way to do this is to teach your child about GO, SLOW, and WHOA foods. The overall message is that all foods can fit into a healthful diet, which consists of more GO foods than SLOW foods, and more SLOW foods than WHOA foods. Basically, Go foods are generally the least processed. These are the healthiest for your body and can be eaten anytime. Examples of these are fresh or frozen fruits and

vegetables. Foods that are OK to eat sometimes are SLOW foods. Cheese and crackers are examples of SLOW foods. WHOA foods are the least healthy and should be eaten only once in awhile. They are most likely to cause weight problems. These are foods that can be common temptations at a holiday celebration • Feed your children – and yourself – a light meal or snack before going to a holiday party. It's harder to avoid overeating when you're overly hungry.

• Set a good example for children by eating fruits, vegetables, and whole grains with meals or as snacks.
